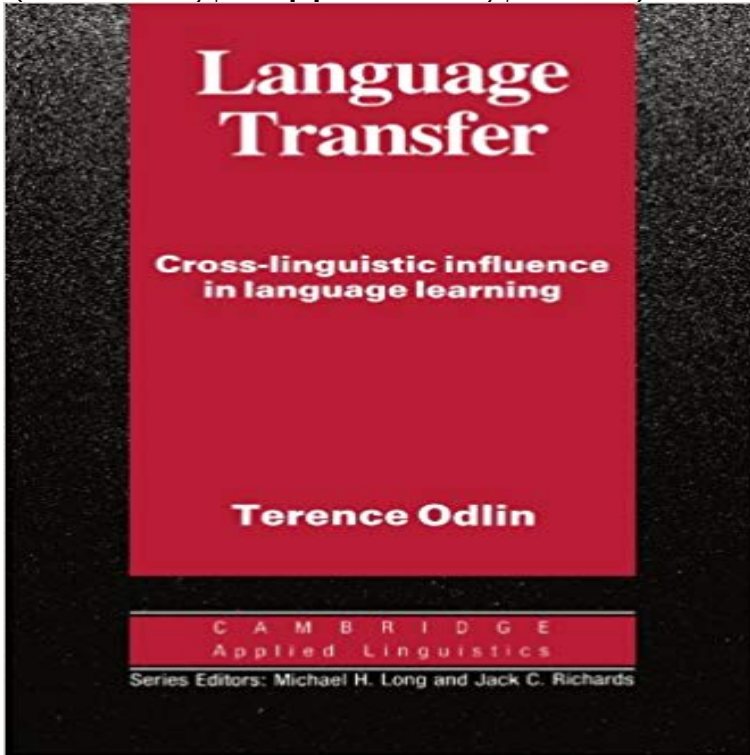


Language Transfer: Cross-Linguistic Influence in Language Learning (Cambridge Applied Linguistics)
